

Greg Simison: An Annotated Checklist.

Greg Simison was born in Guildford, Surrey, England in 1946. His parents moved the family to Canada in 1954, when Simison was 8 years old. Simison finished his schooling in Canada and studied English Literature and Creative Writing at the University of Calgary, Alberta. In Calgary, Simison became known for his organisational abilities in the poetry community. He married Emilia Moretti in 1974. After the dissolution of that short-lived relationship, Simison moved to the Okanagan Valley in 1978 with his common-law spouse, Darlene Wright. They have two children, Sarah and Alex.

Greg Simison has held a variety of jobs, among them weapons technician in the Canadian Navy and hotel night auditor.

Since moving to the Okanagan, Greg Simison has been an omnipresent figure in literary and cultural events in the region. His poetry has been published in national and international periodicals. He is a co-founder (along with John Lent) of the Kalamalka Press and his volume, *The Possibilities of Chinese Trout* (1986) was the catalyst for the Kalamalka New Writers' Poetry Competition. He has taught Continuing Education Creative Writing classes for Okanagan University College.

Simison is also a playwright, whose scripts for murder mysteries have been a mainstay of the literary cultural industry in the North Okanagan. While humour has been a consistent element of Simison's poetry, Professor Christopher Wiseman, in *Canadian Literature*, has captured other strengths: "brilliant in its use of imagery, consistent in tone, cheerfully grotesque". In addition to his poetic output, Simison has been a regular columnist for the *Lumby Valley Times*, where he displayed a fierce and irreverent wit. Simison continues to live and work in Vernon, British Columbia. His contribution to Canadian Literature will be less indeterminate as new volumes secure the foundation of his work in the 1980s and 1990s.
